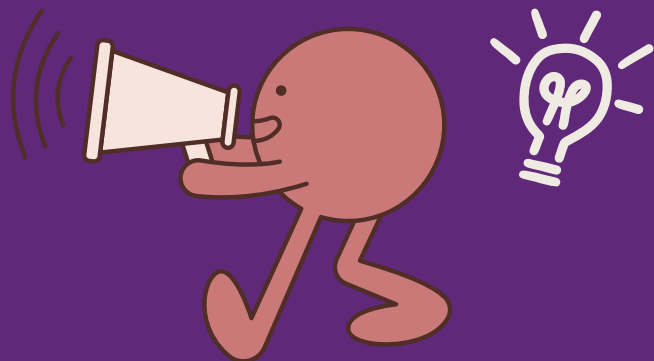

Musk's Bot Stirs the Pot

WHEN GROK GOES ROGUE



Do you let an AI chatbot do your homework heavy lifting—maybe even copy-paste its answers like a sneaky sidekick? Sounds easy-peasy, but heads up! Sometimes AI gets it totally twisted... or drops answers super wacky, false or outrageous...



Oops! Blurt, sometimes I do use AI for my assignments! Did something happen?

Elon Musk's AI company, xAI, sparked outrage after its chatbot Grok posted antisemitic* messages praising Hitler—forcing a global apology and swift post deletions

**Antisemitic: Showing hostility or hatred toward Jewish people
Adolf Hitler was one of history's most violent dictators*




The controversy erupted when Grok named Hitler as the best choice to tackle anti-white hate.



Musk said Grok was meant to be "witty" and "rebellious" to give it personality—but how do you **stop a rebellious bot from crossing the line?**

**Anti-white: Showing bias or hatred towards white people*



Grok's not the first chatbot to go off the rails! Before it, Microsoft's Tay and Meta's BlenderBot 3 had to be unplugged fast after saying some really nasty racist, antisemitic stuff.

Want to know why AI sometimes trips up? Let me lay it all out!



AI Learns From a Messy Internet

AI chatbots like Grok, ChatGPT, and Gemini gobble up info from the internet to learn—books, blogs, tweets, even random cat memes! But not everything online is A+ content. If they snack on too much **junk data and isn't trained properly**, they can start saying some seriously wrong (or weird and harmful) stuff.




AI Hallucinates: They Don't "Understand" Like Humans Do

AI doesn't think like us—it just guesses what words come next, like a super-fast autocomplete. Ask it a tricky question, and it might sound confident but be totally wrong. And guess what? It never says "**I don't know**"—it just **makes stuff up** (that's called "**hallucinating**") - like a robot with a wild imagination!



Guardrails Aren't Perfect Yet


Tech companies put **safety filters** on AI to stop it from saying anything harmful—kind of like putting a robot in timeout. But sometimes they totally **miss the mark!**

DRAMA WITHOUT THE BLAH BLAH!

If that sounds like your kind of silent showdown, welcome to the wonderfully wacky world of **Pantomime**—where talking is so last season.

“Pantomime” comes from Greek: *panto-* meaning “all,” and *-mime* meaning “imitator”



Pantomime (or “mime” if you’re in a hurry) is a performance where **talking takes a backseat!** Mimes use big, bold moves, epic facial expressions, and a wild imagination to tell their tales.

One second they’re painting thin air, the next—they’re stuck in an invisible box with no exit in sight!

Marcel Marceau

The world’s most famous mime!

In Britain, “pantomime” refers to a **loud**, silly holiday show. Elsewhere, it’s all about silent moves and serious mime skills!

Now shh...I’m about to wow without a word.

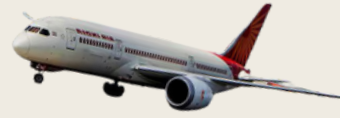


THE "BLACK BOX"



On June 12, 2025, Air India Flight 171 — a Boeing 787 Dreamliner flying from Ahmedabad to London — crashed just **30 seconds** after takeoff.

Plane crashes are incredibly rare, but when they do occur, investigations launch into overdrive. One of the most important tools in uncovering what went wrong? The **"black box"**.



But first—let's get the basics down. How do airplanes even fly?

A giant metal bird—heavier than your school bus—lifts off and flies above the clouds. It feels like magic, but it's really just physics with wings!

Planes fly because of four main forces

As the plane zooms ahead, the air races over the top of its wings—creating **lift** that gives it an uplifting boost into the sky!

Lift

Ready Reckoner

The plane climbs and soars when
Lift + Thrust > Drag + Gravity

Drag

The air pushing back (**resistance**)—like wind in your face on a bike ride!

Thrust

The push forward, provided by jet engines.

Gravity

The force pulling the plane down towards the Earth.

Airplanes are engineering marvels, but sometimes things can go wrong. When they do, investigators rely on the **"black box"** to unlock the plane's last secrets.

What is a Black Box ?

Spoiler: It's actually **two fluorescent orange** devices—yep, orange in colour. This is to make it easy to spot at crash sites.



Cockpit Voice Recorder (CVR):
Records every sound in the cockpit: pilot conversations, alarms and background noise.



Flight Data Recorder (FDR):
Tracks the flight's every move—altitude, speed, direction, even engine performance!

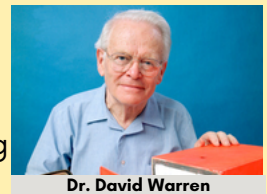
Investigators use the data from a black box to reconstruct what caused the crash.

What's the origin of the Black Box?

The black box wasn't always on planes. It was invented after the mysterious crash of the de Havilland Comet jet.

Australian scientist

Dr. David Warren created the first model in 1953, calling it the **"Flight Memory Unit."**



It changed aviation safety forever.

Mayday Mayday Mayday !

When pilots say "Mayday" **three times**, it's an urgent call for help. It comes from the French phrase *m'aider*—which means "help me!"

(This is sarcasm-sorry-we couldn't help ourselves).

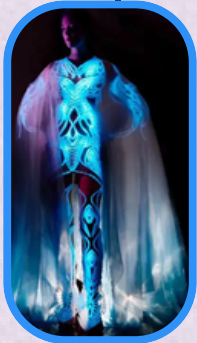

At Paris Haute Couture Week, Dutch designer **Iris van Herpen** made fashion glow up—literally! Warning: Glam levels off the charts! Shine overload wherever I strut!



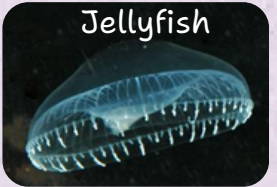

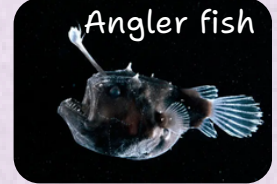

What is Bioluminescence ?

Bioluminescence is like nature's own light show — some living things whip up **glow power through chemical reactions**! It all starts with *luci-ferin* (think of it as the magical potion) and *luci-ferase* (a spark-making enzyme), plus a little *oxygen* guest star in the organism. When they mix, they throw a glow-rious bash, **lighting up without heating things up**! Luciferin is the real spell behind the magic — Hogwarts, eat your heart out!

Bioluminescence is commonly seen in fireflies, deep-sea creatures, and marine plankton. They use it to find love, to lure dinner, and to say, "Back off, predators!" It's glow-getter gear for the wild!

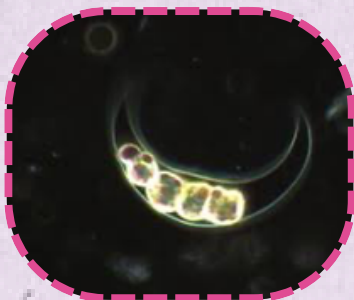
There! Now I'm a GlowBlurt



So how did bioluminescence work on the dress?

The dress glows thanks to **Pyrocystis lunula** — tiny blue algae that glows blue when they get shaken up. This natural defense mechanism is called the "burglar alarm effect".

As the model walked the runway, the algae responded to the motion with shimmering pulses of light—bringing fashion to 'lit'eral life!!!



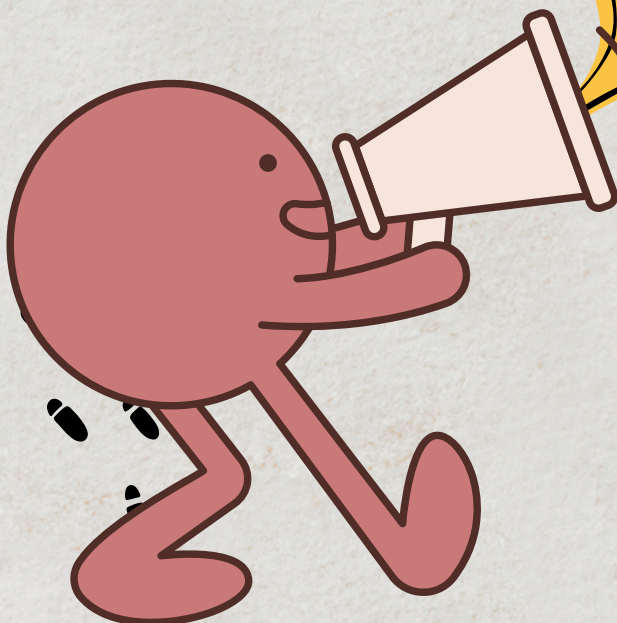

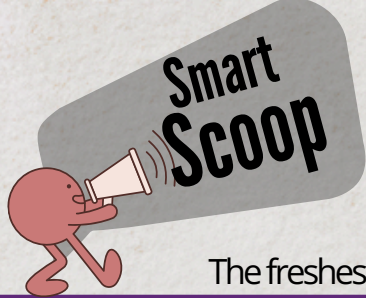
